### ***SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM CHICAGO MULTI-NEIGHBORHOOD PILOT***

#### ***Policy Priorities***

- ✓ The *MISSION* of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot is to target risk and protective factors for alcohol and other substance use and abuse at the individual, family and environmental levels through a *comprehensive approach*, including individual programming, media campaigns, advocacy, and collaboration with law enforcement in select Chicago neighborhoods.
  
- ✓ The *GOALS* of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot are to:
  - *Prevent adolescent substance use particularly relating to alcohol;*
  - *Decrease rates* of alcohol, tobacco and other substance *abuse* among young adults and youth;
  - *Build capacity* at the community-level to address substance abuse-related issues;
  - *Promote* health and well-being in Chicago through expansion and replication of the Multi-Neighborhood Pilot.
  
- ✓ The *OBJECTIVES* of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot are to:
  - *Increase awareness* of the negative effects of alcohol use with a focus on youth from 11 to 19 within the 54 schools in the Pilot Communities.
  - Increase *arrest rates* for alcohol-related violations by 25% each year for 4 years.
  - Engage private-public partnerships within the Pilot Communities to decrease *retail access* of alcohol to youth by 50%.
  - Increase the number of *Party Patrols* in the Pilot Communities by 25% per year for the next 4 years.
  - Evaluate and replicate SAM (Sales of Alcohol to Minors) program and increase retail establishment tests by 2% per year.

### **SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM** **CHICAGO MULTI-NEIGHBORHOOD PILOT**

#### **Policy Priorities**

- ✓ Action Item #1: Increase Youth Awareness of Negative Effects of Alcohol Use
  - Engage in *Public Education Campaign* around youth and adolescent alcohol use prevention.
    - Partner with *Chicago Public Schools* to incorporate alcohol prevention into health and science curriculum at the middle school and high school level.
    - Partner with *Chicago Park District* to promote healthy activities and enforcement of alcohol ordinances in Chicago Parks.
    - Partner with *other Chicago agencies (CTA, CHA, FSS)* to inundate neighborhoods with alcohol prevention messaging.



## The Be United Multi-Neighborhood Collaborative

### ✓ Action Item #2: Crosswalk Violence Prevention and Alcohol Prevention Initiatives

- Establish partnerships between and among local, city, regional and state public entities and community based organizations to add value to existing violence prevention initiatives.
  - Establish strategies to link Gang Interventions with Alcohol Prevention.
  - Work with mental health agencies to establish strategies for aggressive behavior as it relates to alcohol use and abuse.
  - Increase number of alcohol-related arrests made and Party Patrols conducted by Chicago Police Department.
  - Utilize restorative justice techniques for minor alcohol offenses and for incorporating parents and underage minors in sanctions.

### ✓ Action Item #3: Enforce Existing codes and laws and create new laws to eradicate retail access

- Enforce Limitations on Access to Alcohol by minors
  - Enforce existing codes and laws relating to alcohol sales to minors.
  - Establish new code requiring keg registration and mandatory Bassett Training

- Strengthen existing anti-loitering ordinances to deter congregating in commercial parking lots and other areas.

### ✓ Action Item #4: Integrate family and community support services

- Establish family and community support systems for youth with a focus on training and program development.
  - Evaluate existing family and community services.
  - Implement evidence-based trainings through utilizing faith and community based infrastructure.
  - Assess full range of social service agencies for service referral.

#### **BASSET TRAINING PROGRAM**

##### **Issue:**

Alcohol use and abuse continues to be a serious problem among youth. According to the Illinois Youth Survey approximately 20% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 30% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 40% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 60% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders regularly use alcohol. The SAPP Multi-neighborhood Pilot is a broad-based approach to curbing these rates and creating a culture promoting success. The BASSET Training Program is designed to build awareness and accountability by liquor licensees related to sales of alcohol to minors.

##### **Proposed Action:**

Amend section 4-60-020 of the Chicago Municipal Code as follows:

(a) No person shall sell at retail any alcoholic liquor without first having obtained a city retailer's license for each premises where the retailer is located to sell the same. Licensees shall be required to provide proof of completion of the State's Beverage Alcohol Sellers and Servers Education and Training (BASSET) program by all sellers and servers.

##### **Rationale:**

The City is engaged in a multi-year, multi-neighborhood pilot project to promote a Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP). As part of the federally-funded SAPP, the lead agencies have determined that education and awareness by liquor licensees of issues related to underage drinking is essential. The State's BASSETT Program provides a system by which liquor licensees can be trained and educated on issues involving sales to minors.

### ***SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM CHICAGO MULTI-NEIGHBORHOOD PILOT Law Enforcement Action Plan (LEAP)***

#### **Issue:**

Alcohol use and abuse continues to be a serious problem among youth. According to the Illinois Youth Survey approximately 20% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 30% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 40% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 60% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders regularly use alcohol. The SAPP Multi-neighborhood Pilot is a broad-based approach to curbing these rates and creating a culture promoting success. The Law Enforcement Action Plan (LEAP) is designed to bolster and support the Chicago Police Department's efforts to deter youth related alcohol offenses by increasing enforcement.

#### **Proposed Action:**

Amend section 8-16-065 to include new section (e) as follows:

(e) Out of the fines collected from this section and other funds, the Chicago Police Department shall be provided resources for the Law Enforcement Action Plan (LEAP) to deter youth alcohol consumption by increasing party patrols and arrests by 25% each per year commencing in 2011, and sustaining those numbers thereafter. The LEAP will also develop, in consultation with other relevant City departments a restorative justice program to promote community service for minor alcohol offenses, and Administrative Notice of Violations to parents and youth involved in first offense social hosting. The CPD shall provide an annual report to the City Council on the status and progress of the LEAP.

#### **Rationale:**

The City is engaged in a multi-year, multi-neighborhood pilot project to promote a Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP). As part of the federally-funded SAPP, the lead agencies have determined that law enforcement deterrence is a key priority. One key element of the Law Enforcement Action Plan (LEAP) for deterring increased alcohol consumption is to provide CPD additional resources for party patrols and arrests related to social hosting. In addition, a system of restorative justice should be developed for minor alcohol-related offenses. In order to assess the LEAP progress, a report of activity should be prepared and shared with City policymakers.

### **KEG REGISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM**

#### **Issue:**

Alcohol use and abuse continues to be a serious problem among youth. According to the Illinois Youth Survey approximately 20% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 30% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 40% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 60% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders regularly use alcohol. The SAPP Multi-neighborhood Pilot is a broad-based approach to curbing these rates and creating a culture promoting success. The Keg Registration Enforcement Program is designed to deter youth-related alcohol offenses through mandating adults to register when obtaining kegs of beer.

#### **Proposed Action:**

Amend section 8-16-065 to include language requiring an individual purchasing a keg to register and acknowledge responsibility for the use of the keg.

#### **Rationale:**

The City is engaged in a multi-year, multi-neighborhood pilot project to promote a Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP). As part of the federally-funded SAPP, the lead agencies have determined that deterring social hosting is a key priority. One key element of social hosting is to hold those purchasing kegs responsible for the use of the keg by adults of drinking age.

#### **STRENGTHENING ANTI-LOITERING**

##### **Issue:**

Alcohol use and abuse continues to be a serious problem among youth. According to the Illinois Youth Survey approximately 20% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 30% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 40% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 60% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders regularly use alcohol. The SAPP Multi-neighborhood Pilot is a broad-based approach to curbing these rates and creating a culture promoting success. Underage drinking regularly occurs in public ways and commercial areas designated for parking.

##### **Proposed Action:**

Amend section **8-4-030** of the Chicago Municipal Code as follows:

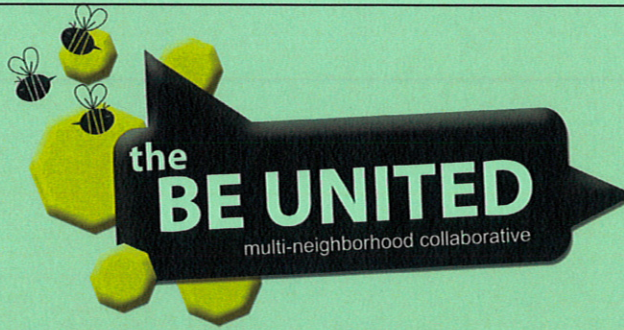
(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to drink any alcoholic liquor as defined by law on any public way or in or about any motor vehicle upon a public way in the city, or to facilitate the consumption of alcohol by minors in such public ways or commercial areas designated for parking under the provisions of this Code. This section shall not apply to portions of the public way occupied by a sidewalk café permitted pursuant to Chapter 10-28 of the municipal code which is properly licensed to sell alcoholic liquor, or to any portion of the public way located on Navy Pier; or to any venue holding a valid Riverwalk Venue liquor license under Section 4-60-074

##### **Rationale:**

The City is engaged in a multi-year, multi-neighborhood pilot project to promote a Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP). As part of the federally-funded SAPP, the lead agencies have determined that deterring underage drinking in public ways and commercial areas designated for parking is essential.

**PLEASE SUPPORT AN ORDINANCE AMENDING 8-4-030 FURTHER REGULATING UNDERAGE DRINKING IN PUBLIC WAYS AND COMMERCIAL AREAS DESIGNATED FOR PARKING.**

#### STRENGTHENING FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

##### Issue:

Alcohol use and abuse continues to be a serious problem among youth. According to the Illinois Youth Survey approximately 20% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 30% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 40% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 60% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders regularly use alcohol. The SAPP Multi-neighborhood Pilot is a broad-based approach to curbing these rates and creating a culture promoting success. An essential component of a comprehensive strategy for addressing these issues must target risk and protective factors for alcohol and other substance use and abuse at the individual, family and environmental levels through a *comprehensive approach*, including family and community involvement.

##### Proposed Action:

Adopt a Resolution supporting the work of the Substance Abuse Prevention Program Multi-neighborhood Pilot by encouraging the creation of an interagency working group to assess and develop implementation strategies to:

- *Prevent* adolescent substance use particularly relating to alcohol;
- *Decrease rates* of alcohol, tobacco and other substance abuse among young adults and youth;
- *Build capacity* at the community-level to address substance abuse-related issues;
- *Promote* health and well-being in Chicago by through replication of the Multi-Neighborhood Pilot.

##### Rationale:

The City is engaged in a multi-year, multi-neighborhood pilot project to promote a Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP). As part of the federally-funded SAPP, the lead agencies have determined that it is imperative for the City agencies to support the work of the Multi-Neighborhood Pilot, and to assess the availability of family and community support services to further the goals and objectives of the Program.

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the mission of the Substance Abuse Prevention Program Multi-Neighborhood Pilot is to target risk and protective factors for alcohol and other substance use and abuse at the individual, family and environmental levels through a comprehensive approach, including individual programming, media campaigns, advocacy, and collaboration with City agencies in the participating communities of Back-of-the-Yards, Brighton Park, Bridgeport, and Englewood, all within Chicago Police District 9; and,

WHEREAS, the goals of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot are to prevent adolescent substance use particularly relating to alcohol; decrease rates of alcohol, tobacco and other substance abuse among young adults and youth; build capacity at the community-level to address substance abuse-related issues; promote health and well-being in Chicago by through replication of the Multi-Neighborhood Pilot; and,

WHEREAS, the objectives of the SAPP Multi-Neighborhood Pilot include but are not limited to, increasing awareness of the negative effects of alcohol use with a focus on youth from 11 to 19 within the 54 schools in the Pilot Communities; engaging in Public Education Campaign around youth and adolescent alcohol use prevention; partnering with Chicago Public Schools to incorporate alcohol prevention into health and science curriculum at the middle school and high school level; partnering with Chicago Park District to promote healthy activities and enforcement of alcohol ordinances in Chicago Parks; partnering with other Chicago agencies (CTA, CHA, FSS, CDPH) to inundate neighborhoods with alcohol prevention messaging; and to establish family and community support systems for youth with a focus on training and program development; evaluating existing family and community services; implementing evidence-based trainings through utilizing faith and community based infrastructure; and assessing full range of social service agencies for service referral.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE CITY COUNCIL as follows:

An Interagency Working Group is hereby established between and among the various City Departments listed above, with the Department of Family and Support Services designated as the lead agency, for the purposes of assessing and implementing family and community support services for underage substance use, as more specifically herein set forth.
